## CELEBRATING RURAL BRITAIN

The Countryside Alliance Awards (nicknamed the Rural Oscars) is now in its 13<sup>th</sup> year and is an annual celebration of British food & farming, enterprise and heritage through our small hard working businesses. The Awards is defined by its public-led nominations, which offers customers the chance to tell us why their favourite businesses are worthy of national acclaim. The Rural Oscars represent the gold standard in rural business awards, and winning is a testament to a business's commitment to hard-work, community and the countryside.

The 2017 Awards has been a record year, with over II,000 nominations, which demonstrates the growing popularity amongst consumers of buying/supporting 'local', and the importance of rural businesses to their communities.

## GAME CHAMPION AWARD

At a time when everyone is talking about boosting the game meat market, the Countryside Alliance has introduced the award to honour excellence in promoting and marketing game to the general public. From the II,000 nominations, the Countryside Alliance has chosen four businesses who we think are worthy of the title Game Champion.

#### The shortlisted businesses are:

#### VICARS GAME Berkshire

Game is at the heart of this business which has grown from humble beginnings. Now game in the surrounding countryside area has a strong market. The quality and diversity of their products has attracted the attention of local customers, as well as the London restaurant market.

## THE CLARISSA DICKSON WRIGHT AWARD

The Clarissa Dickson Wright Award was instituted in 2013 with Clarissa's full knowledge and support. Her Award centres on her beliefs in campaigning, educating and prioritising slow food, taste, quality and support for our farmers and producers.

#### Clarissa's criteria

#### Husbandry: Focus on strong animal

husbandry and butchery, support for slow and artisan food and a platform for the efforts being made to foster our farming heritage through measures such as protecting rare breeds.

**Education**: Farmers and producers need to help the public connect with their food. We should honour them when they get it right. **Campaigning**: For businesses or individuals keen to educate, inform and ignite a passion for food, and not to sit and take bureaucracy and misinformation. This is the powerful heart of this award.
